New judicial group studying evidence based decision making in justice system

Judicial officials in Tipton County are in a select group of people in the United States who are studying evidence-based decision making (EBDM) in Local Criminal Justice Systems Initiative. Three states selected in this study were Indiana, Wisconsin and Virginia. In Indiana, the six counties selected were Tipton County, the smallest county participating in the study; Hendricks County; Hamilton County; Porter County; Bartholomew Jefferson County and County.

According to Tipton County Circuit Court Judge Thomas R. Lett, team leader, and Community Corrections Director Tracy

Regnier, team leader, the National Institute Corrections (NIC) launched EBDM in June 2008. This study aims to create a systemwide framework reduce pretrial misconduct and post-conviction offending. In February 2015 the NIC announced its partnership with the three abovementioned states to "replicate and expand EBDM to multiple local jurisdictions and state-level policy teams " The goal of this The goal of this partnership is to "support the alignment of local and state systems of driven, collaborative, and guided by evidence-based decision making.

What does this mean for Tipton County? During this coming year an EBDM policv team will examine every

step in the criminal justice process. The team will determine what stens are effective and what ones changed. results is research-based "best practices." The aim of all this study is to reduce recidivism and to make the sentence fit the individual.

Judge Lett noted Tipton County lacks many social services because it is a small county. Also, an antiquated jail does not lend itself to being much more than a holding place. With the potential of a new jail, comes the opportunity for the correctional system to "regroup" and make decisions based on research of what is effective
